Extracts from the log book of St Mary's Street Wesleyan Methodist School

1871

May 1st This school was opened by me today. J. Gardner.

2nd No. present at all to-day 61.

3rd Received supply of books etc., from Westminster.

Sent out circulars to the mill owners of the neighbourhood requesting them to permit the Wesleyan half-timers in their employ to attend this school.

I find very great difficulty in getting the children to attend punctually. They seem to be left very much to their own choice as to whether they come or not. I have now got the school organised in five classes. None of the children are at present fit for presentation above the new stand[ard] II.

June 12th Very few children present in time for opening. Great difficulty in getting punctual attendance. Half-timers almost as bad as the full-day scholars. One reason may be that the mothers of many of the children are employed in the mills and are thus, to some extent, prevented from pushing their children off to school. The breakfast time allowed in the mills is from 8 to 8.30 in some instances but most commonly from 8.30 to 9 o'clock.

13th Admitted six new scholars this week.

17th No. present this week 73.

21st Admitted three new scholars this week.

22nd Closed to-day for the Summer holidays.

July 10th Re-opened this morning after the Summer vacation. Admitted 15 new scholars.

14th Heavy rain. School almost empty at time of opening. We have inserted three advertisements in the local papers for a P.T. *[pupil teacher]* but have had no applicants as yet. First advertisement appeared 5 weeks ago.

"Wanted, for the New Wesleyan Day School, St. Mary's Street, New Hall Lane, a MALE PUPIL TEACHER. - Apply any evening at 13 St Ignatius Square.

25th Fred Lutener came today as a Candidate.

September

21st Sent Fred Lutener away from school to-day. Has become very unpunctual in his attendance. There seems

to be a general want of attachment to his work.

October

4th Nothing new.

11th Ordinary progress. Admitted six this week.

19th O.P. [ordinary progress]

23rd Watson Ogden came as a Candidate today.

5 weeks marked simply 'O.P.'

December

4th Received a factory book from Messrs Paley's to-day;
